SCHOOL SESSIONS SINCE NOVEMBER

Since October half term, Rachel and Hayley have worked with over 200 students at the following schools across Bradford and Keighley:

In Bradford - Brackenhill Primary Year 5 and Newby Primary Year 4

In Keighley - Ingrow Primary Year 4, Oldfield Primary Years 4-6, Our Lady of Victories Primary Year 4, University Academy Keighley Year 7, Worth Valley Primary Year 4

It has been a real pleasure working with all students exploring Health & Hygiene, the Mill Trade, Servants & Workers, Homes & Buildings, Clothes as a Clue, Holidays & Festivities, and Identity. Here are some facts we have found out about where we live:

- The mill trade employed the most people in Bradford and Keighley. It made Bradford into a city and its population increased by 90,000 over 50 years in the height of the Industrial Revolution.
- If you lived in Bradford or Keighley in the Industrial Revolution, you would need to survive water-bourne diseases, smoke-polluted air, keeping out of the workhouse and loom machine accidents.
- There were many servants who worked at Cliffe Castle and Bolling Hall. It was their job to run the household for the Butterfield and Tempest families, including cleaning, cooking, teaching the children and keeping the gardens tidy.
- Sir Richard Tempest, who was the Master of Bolling Hall, died in prison in 1537 after confronting King Henry VIII on the dissolution of the monasteries.
- Keighley is making history in the summer part of the area will be on the route for the Tour de France!
